## DFT member activism builds to meet big challenges

The 2015-16 school year brought a number of challenges for Detroit Federation of Teachers members, our students and our school district.

Years of financial neglect and mismanagement by a series of state-appointed emergency managers created a crisis in the Detroit Public Schools that reached critical mass.

DFT members rose to the challnge by engaging in unprecedented collective action in the fight to save our neighborhood public schools and to oppose attacks on the rights of professional educators.

Over the past few months, DFT members have:

- Sent thousands of emails;
- Made thousands of calls to residents around the state and legislators through phone banking;
- Knocked on hundreds of doors through neighborhood canvassing;
- · Sent hundreds of letters; and
- Held dozens of meetings with AFT Michigan members and legislators to support public education in Detroit.

## Teachers make headlines for making a difference

#### Cass Tech's Marilyn McCormick honored during nationally televised Tony Awards program

Detroit Federation of Teachers member Marilyn McCormick is the 2016 recipient of the Excellence in Theatre Education Award, presented by the Tony Awards and Carnegie Mellon University.

A drama instructor at Cass Technical High School, McCormick accepted the award on June 12 in New York during the annual Tony Awards, which recognize achievement in Broadway productions.

The prestigious award is presented to education professionals who "discover talented students, nurture

them, inspire them and set them off on a lifelong journey as theatre supporters and professionals," according to the Tony Awards Web page.

McCormick, a 40-year education veteran, was chosen from a pool of more than 1,100 entries submitted from schools around the country. She was nominated by former students via written testimonials and a video presentation.

In addition to a trip to New York and accommodations, the award also provides a \$10,000 grant for Cass Tech's theater program.

"The DFT wishes to congratulate Ms. McCormick on this incredible honor," said Ivy Bailey, interim DFT president. "We want to express our grati-



tude to her for her years of outstanding service to our school district and our community."

"It feels great to have people wanting to help the work of supporting our kids," she said.

#### Three Detroit teachers awarded Fulbright Scholarships to Brazil

This year's Fulbright Scholarship Award recipients include three Detroit Public Schools teachers.

#### They are:

- Karen Russell, a first-grade teacher at Edison Elementary School;
- Rachel Walker, a visual arts teacher at Renaissance High School; and
- William Bowles, a media instructor/librarian at Western International High School.

Scholarship recipients will participate in a collaborative project in Brazil, where they will consult with schools, nonprofit organizations, teacher training institutions and other educational organizations.

#### **Contract negotiations**

On June 30, the collective bargaining agreement between the Detroit Federation of Teachers and the Detroit Public Schools expires.

As a result of the recently passed DPS education bills, the DFT expects that contract negotiations will be challenging. Union negotiators met with DPS leaders today to begin talks on a new contract agreement. We are committed to working for the best possible contract for our members.

#### **School board elections**

The Detroit education plan approved last week in the Michigan Legislature calls for the return of Detroit Public Schools to a locally elected board.

Voters will elect members to serve on the DPS school board during the general elections this November.

The future of our school district is at stake. It is critical for educators to have a strong, united voice when it comes to electing members to serve on the school board.

The DFT is counting on members to be engaged and active in helping to ensure that pro-public education candidates are elected. We need school board members who will

stand with and fight for Detroit's students and educators.

#### Still committed

When our contract expires on June 30, Detroit school employees lose the right to have union dues deducted automatically from pay checks. This attack on payroll deduction rights is an attempt to silence the voice of educators by weakening our union.

The same lawmakers who tried to kill public education in Detroit and strip educators of our jobs and our rights also have made it inconvenient for union members to pay dues.

When the new school year begins, only members will have a say in the direction of our union; only members will be able to participate in union activities, such as internal elections, negotiations for a new contract and other important decisions.
